THE NU CHAPTER HOLIDAY LUNCHEON



MESSAGE FROM THE PRYTANIS

Fraters of the Nu Chapter,

My name is Zach Leighton, and I have been very fortunate to serve as TKE Nu's 2024 Prytanis. I am a Junior majoring in Urban Studies and minoring in Public Policy, and a part of the Spring 2023 Alpha Sigma pledge class. While the house has certainly had difficult times over this past year and especially throughout the pandemic, we have already seen lots of positive change and we are primed for even more in the near future.

After a great rush the past two semesters, we have a strong brotherhood of over 60 active members, and we are primed to add 10 more new members by the conclusion of this semester. Since Covid, the house has had far fewer live-ins than in the past, leading to not only financial hardship but also a much different experience for those who do live-in, with far more closed doors and less activity on a daily basis. From last Spring to this Fall, we were able to increase the number of live-ins from 25 to 36, which has led to an incredible change in the day to day energy in the house and has been significantly more fun for the house as a whole.

On top of the increase in live-ins, there have been many projects completed recently which have added lots of value to our house. We have had the front of the house professionally repainted, put new vinyl floors in 2B and 3B, and rebuilt our DJ stand. Our most innovative project of the past year has been the first floor Gentleman's Room, which has been added to and worked on over the course of the year. Thanks in large part to a generous donation from housing board president Mark Edelstone, we were able to put couches, a coffee table, a tv and sound system, a pool table, end tables, and more items to make the room a truly enjoyable place to be. Over the past few years, the room had been used for random storage or just empty space. This transformation project has been a huge success, with brothers using the room to study, eat lunch together, watch sports together, and much more. Our Hypophetes has also done a great job utilizing the space, planning movie nights and a super bowl watch party which drew really great attendance from the brothers (and have been some of my personal favorite events with the house).

This past Spring, we had great success with our philanthropy, raising thousands of dollars for St. Jude's through TKE Week, in which we hosted philanthropy events every day of the week leading up to Cal Day. We held a live music night with friends inside and out of the greek community, a rodeo themed event with a sorority, as well as a clothing drive / thrift day held with GASA (Greeks Against Sexual Assault). Our most popular event of the week, TKE Trivia, was also a great success, with almost 20 teams from different sororities donating to our philanthropy for a fun night of trivia and music. We've also been very active in other philanthropies, including participating in Delta Gamma's Anchor Splash dance competition, Chi Omega's kickball tournament (which we won!), and winning a Redbull charity competition for spinal cord research, in which brothers raised almost a thousand dollars for the cause.

The brotherhood has also been very active in the Cal sports scene, hosting game day parties and alumni barbecues on the deck before the brothers head off to Memorial Stadium to have their hearts broken by a Cal missed field goal. Of course,

ALUMNI SPOTLIGHT - ERIC TYE

We're all aware of how the COVID-19 pandemic changed life as we knew it in the beginning of 2020. But less known is that one of our very own TKEs, Eric Tye, played an instrumental role in helping the world respond to the pandemic by supporting the global commercialization of Gilead's antiviral therapy, remdesivir (VEKLURY®), one of the first commercially available products aimed at combating COVID-19. I had the pleasure of connecting with Eric for this alumni showcase to learn more about his significant accomplishments and life moments along the way.

Eric was destined to be a Cal Bear. He grew up in San Ramon and has a deep family history of Cal alumni (including both parents, his grandmother, two aunts, three uncles and three cousins). He is the middle child of three brothers, and while his older brother chose UCLA over Berkeley (don't worry, the family still gives him a hard time for being a "baby bear"), both he and his younger brother made the right choice to attend UC Berkeley. Befitting his eventual major (economics), he only applied to UCs because of the great value. His decision came down to UC Santa Barbara and Cal, and the decision to attend Berkeley he claimed to be "one of the best decisions of [his] life."

Eric was not intent on joining a fraternity, but his personality and past experiences guided him in that direction. In high school he played football and was a captain of the varsity team. The team made the CIF-North Coast Section championship and played De La Salle in the Oakland Coliseum. Eric had shoulder surgery mid-season and could not play in the championship, and his team was defeated. My money is on these two facts being related. His football experience taught him a lot about hard work, teamwork and brotherhood. He had a strong group of friends and knew he wanted to find great guys to surround himself with at Cal. While he rushed several houses, the quality of the people and the actual brotherly bond he observed at Tau Kappa Epsilon made TKE the easy choice.

A self-admitted "not good" pledge, he soaked up the environment and bonded with pledges and brothers. After his initiation, he was very active in the chapter with roles of rush chair

and epiprytanis, while also being a big brother three times. His love for bringing great guys into the fraternity and ensuring TKE was well run and living up to the core values attracted him to these roles.

Football game days were a highlight of his time at Cal. One of his favorite memories was the legendary game at Stanfurd his senior year when Cal upset Andrew Luck's squad and he rushed the field with fellow Tekes. For home games, his family would always make the trip to the house. Eric loved hosting them, and the two-story, two-person beer bong was a key attraction. Eric was a professional at racing the beer bong, with a reported record of 13-0 mid-way through one season. His dad's friend and fraternity brother boasted a reputation for chugging and challenged Eric. Eric won, but the competitive spirit of his father's friend did not die. With the barb that he had "figured it out", he demanded a rematch the following week. He returned the next week, and was accompanied by his ten year old son. There was a huge crowd for the rematch, as word had spread throughout TKE. This time, Eric lost by a hair and the winner turned around with a bellowing yell and his fists raised in the air in victory. Seeing his son's wide-eyed excitement, he shook Eric's hand and then leaned down to his son and said, "You see all these people? They worked really hard to get here so they could have fun on days like this. If you work hard, you can come here and have fun too." Eric and the brothers found the moment a hilarious lesson in parenting, and the story became legend.

One of the best things Eric got out of the TKE experience was his now wife, Abi. After briefly meeting at a TKE party, they crossed paths again and Eric confidently asked "Liz, right?" Abi did not let him escape the blunder, but the two started dating despite Eric's suaveness. Their relationship grew throughout college and continues to flourish to this day.

Eric was always strong with numbers and gravitated towards quantitative classes but did not have his sights on a specific major coming into college. He explored a lot of different majors, but gained clear focus based on the US economy. The Great Recession was unfolding, and economics classes helped Eric make sense

out of the complication. The incredible economics professors (including Christina Romer, former chair of the Council of Economic Advisers in the Obama administration and designer of the 2009 federal bailout) helped further Eric's knowledge in the area and provided a great education.

Beyond TKE being a group of guys that were really fun to hang out with, the fraters truly became Eric's brothers and

helped him grow into the man he is today. Through all the highs and lows, they challenged, supported and celebrated with him. After graduation, he moved to San Francisco with three other Tekes (Kyle Meshna, Dain Adamson and Brett Goldstien). This crew along with other recent graduates soaked up all SF opportunities (Outside Lands, Fleet Week, Santa Con, etc.) and went on entertaining trips including the alumni 'bago trip to UCLA and an epic snowboarding road trip to Utah and Wyoming. Eric claims "it was a blast to be young and dumb together in SF."

Realizing that he wanted to be a part of something bigger than himself and have a positive impact in the world, his career search out of college was focused on healthcare or renewable energy. He found himself at ZS Associates, a consulting company specializing in biopharma. The people reminded him of TKE, being smart, motivated and well rounded. There he was able to be deployed to challenging and interesting projects where he was able to learn and assist companies that were literally changing millions of patients' lives with their therapies. At ZS, he started doing a lot of commercial analytics projects to support Gilead's launch of their treatments that cure Hepatitis C. In 2015, after working on many Gilead projects, they reached out to Eric to lead physician market research.

While working at Gilead, Eric figured that he had not had enough Cal experiences in his life. In 2017, he went back to Haas part-time to get his MBA. It was a grueling process to work full time while taking evening classes in Berkeley for his MBA, but Eric has always found that when he pushes himself outside his comfort zone, he grows, and the MBA program was no exception. He graduated, via Zoom, in 2020, to add a second Cal degree to his name.

As the pandemic hit, it is not news to anyone that the world began scrambling for therapies to prevent, treat or cure the disease. The first candidate to have real impact on the coronavirus was Gilead's antiviral medication remdesivir. While it captured the news headlines, it also captured our very own Eric Tye to support the commercialization efforts through leading Global Analytics and Insights. His team gathers and evaluates data to understand things such as how many patients are receiving the product, why

qualifying patients may not be receiving the product and how to communicate the clinical benefit with physicians and patients. Eric is also working to inform Gilead's product development for COVID-19 by running analyses such as forecasting how many people will get COVID-19 over the next five years and the potential for next generation treatments for patients not yet hospitalized with the virus

As we emerge from the pandemic, Eric has big things on the horizon. He has been together with Abi for over twelve years and finally had their wedding in the summer of 2022 (originally planned for 2020 but postponed due to COVID-19). They bought a house in Castro Valley in 2022 and are making that house a home. And they recently welcomed a beautiful baby boy, Cooper Michael Tye in March 2024. A couple years ago he trained for and completed the trans-Tahoe relay swim with fellow Teke Avi Baskin, his older brother and other friends. Always thirsty for outdoor adventures, he continues backpacking and freediving/spearfishing, often performing the latter with fellow Tekes Jeff Young and David Wong. He has always loved the ocean, and he views taking a single breath and diving down in search of fish as the most pure way to interact with the ocean and harvest his own food. During a freediving training class, he hit a personal best dive of 111 feet but says he typically goes only 30-40 feet in search of fish.

In just eleven years out from graduation, Eric has flourished in life. He has career successes, being a Director at Gilead that has directly supported the COVID-19 response. He has personal successes, surrounded by loving friends, family and wonderful partner to explore those things that he enjoys about life. His life has been supplemented by the great experiences and relationships through Tau Kappa Epsilon, and he continues to push himself to live his best life and live by his strong values. We do not know what is exactly in store for Eric's future, but we look forward to being included in the journey as friends and brothers.
